ICAC Unit/ Task Force

The Idaho Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force is 1 of 61 ICAC Task Forces in the country. It is a multi-jurisdictional coalition of federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies that investigate and prosecute individuals who use the Internet or other technology to criminally exploit children. It is comprised of 10 ICAC Unit Affiliates and over 100 + Task Force Affiliates Statewide.



What Do We Investigate?

The Attorney General's ICAC Unit investigates instances of possession, distribution, and trafficking of child sexual abuse material (CSAM). We also investigate cases of sextortion which is where children are threatened or blackmailed, most often with the possibility of sharing with the public a nude or sexual images of them, by a person who demands additional sexual content, sexual activity, or money.

SIGNS OF VICTIMIZATION



- Your child becomes withdrawn and isolated from family and friends.
- You find inappropriate material on the computer, tablet, or phone.
- Your child receives mail, money, or gifts from unknown people.



WHAT TO DO IF SOMEONE IS VICTIMIZED



- Make it clear that the victimization is not his or her fault.
- Save all evidence of victimization, such as e-mails, conversations, or photos.
- Contact your local law-enforcement agency immediately.
- Make a report to the **Cyber Tip line**® or call **1-800-THELOST**® and include all information available.
